FACULTY OF HUMANITIES (FLSH)

HISTORY

The establishment of the Faculty of Humanities at the Saint Joseph University of Beirut dates back to 1976. This collective decision by former leaders of the renowned School of Languages in Beirut aimed to fill the significant gap left by its closure with a worthy successor. For thirty years, the School had been a beacon of excellence in humanities education across Lebanon and the Middle East.

Initially inaugurated in October 1977, the Faculty of Humanities began with six departments including French literature, philosophy, history and geography, psychology and sociology. Over time, it expanded to include the Institute of Oriental Studies, renamed the Department of Arabic Studies in 1996. Additionally, the departments of history and geography were separated into distinct entities.

Subsequently, the Faculty incorporated additional institutions such as the Center for Arabic Research and Studies and the Center for Modern Arab Studies in 1977, the Lebanese School of Social Work in 1978, and the Lebanese Institute of Educators in 1979 (later becoming part of the Faculty of Education in 1999).

These initiatives aimed to unify scattered efforts and integrate diverse disciplines, schools, and research centers into a unified hub, sharing a common goal: establish a center dedicated to teaching and research in humanities, steadfast in its commitment to the profound humanistic values cherished by the Jesuits, who had originally founded the Oriental Faculty seventy-five years earlier. In pursuit of this vision, the Faculty expanded its influence by establishing key entities: The Center for Language Studies (in 1977), the Institute of Languages and Translation, and the School of Translators and Interpreters of Beirut (in 1980, later becoming the Faculty of Languages in 2012), the Institute of Theatre, Audiovisual and Cinematic Studies in 1988, and finally, ESMOD Beirut in 2020. In 1986, the Faculty of Humanities also acquired collections from the library of the former School of Languages, which have since autonomously grown to encompass over 125,000 titles.

Since its inception, the Faculty's expansion has been relentless and ongoing. New programs have proliferated, including tourism, environmental and urban planning, international relations, information and communication, leadership, and human resources management. Alongside these advancements, new laboratories have been established such as the Laboratory of Mapping, Laboratory of Remote Sensing, and the University Observatory on Social and Economic Reality (OURSE), as well as research centers like the Michel Henry Center for Phenomenology, CERGES, etc. In 1997, the Monnot Theatre was inaugurated in the underground spaces of the Jesuit residence, followed in 2000 by the Museum of Lebanese Prehistory. The Faculty relocated from its original Huvelin Street premises to new facilities on Damascus Road in 2000, which include a splendid library and another theater, the Béryte. Each year has seen the introduction of new programs and numerous master's degrees, such as the Master in Art Criticism and Curatorial Studies, Master in Event Planning, Master in Clinical and Pathological Psychology: Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, and Master in Leadership and Human Resources Management. These additions have significantly enriched the academic offerings of one of the Saint Joseph University of Beirut's most dynamic faculties.

MISSION

Since its establishment in 1976, the Faculty has been a leader in educating students who are both versatile and specialists in their chosen disciplines, proficient in three languages, and equipped with both theoretical knowledge and practical skills gained through internships and partnerships with professionals. The Faculty aims to foster critical thinking, analytical and synthesis skills, and communication abilities among students, as well as advance knowledge through research, and shape engaged citizens.

SPECIFIC PROVISIONS OF THE INTERNAL REGULATIONS OF STUDY

Article 6: Languages

- a. Languages of instruction
 - French and Arabic are the two main languages of instruction. Some courses or study programs are taught in English.
- b. French proficiency requirements
 - Prior to any registration in the first cycle for French-speaking programs, the candidate must have been placed in category "A" at the French Placement Test (TALF).
 - However, a candidate placed in category "B" on this test is allowed to provisionally register in certain institutions. As soon as they register and during the first year of their studies, they take compulsory remedial French language courses which replace a 4-credit free elective course. These courses are offered by the USJ Faculty of Languages and Translation in three successive sessions during the first and second semesters, and during the summer term.

An "A" level test is administered at the end of every session. Students who pass the test validate the four credits; their registration becomes final and they can pursue their studies. Students who do not pass the first session may register for the second session; if they fail the second session, they may register for the summer session. Students who do not pass the test after the three sessions will not be able to renew their registration. Institutions may, in their "Specific Provisions" of the Internal Regulations of Study, extend the "A" level requirement to all first-time registrations for graduate programs.

Specific provisions at FLSH:

Students from the Departments of French Literature and Psychology are required to take a second French language proficiency test for potential linguistic tutoring if needed.

c. Arabic proficiency requirements

In the Bachelor program, students must validate at least four credits of Arabic language courses. In a Master program, students must validate at least two credits of Arabic language courses. Exemptions from Arabic language courses may be granted by the USJ Equivalence Commission.

d. English proficiency requirements

To obtain their Bachelor, students who have been placed in level "A" on the English Placement Test or who have passed levels "E", "D", "C" or "B" and reached level "A" must pass the corresponding level "A" course. Additionally, they must take the Proficiency Test administered by Saint Louis University.

Article 46. Election of Class Representatives

a. The election is held by year of study in every program. The representatives and their substitutes are elected at the beginning of every academic year, according to the "Specific Provisions" of the Internal Regulations of every institution.

Specific provisions at FLSH:

In departments with limited enrollment, the election of one representative and one substitute per cycle or per option shall be conducted.

- b. The election takes place under the supervision of an electoral board composed of three members: a representative of the institution, who chairs the board, and two students (the oldest and the youngest of the non-candidate students).
- c. The procedures for the election are established by a special text adopted by the University Board.
