COURSE DESCRIPTION

Common Courses

o11GETGL2 Applied Cartography for Humanities and Social Sciences 3 Cr.

This course is open to all students, especially in the fields of humanities and social sciences. It is primarily designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Environment and Spatial Planning, and Tourism and Cultural Management.

It equips students with the necessary skills to effectively "use geomatics tools" and "apply techniques relevant to tourism professions".

By the end of this course, students will master graphical methods and cartographic techniques, enabling them to create and develop analytical maps relevant to their fields of study and professional practice.

o11TODRL4 Beirut: From Destruction to Reconstruction 3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management, it is also open to all USJ students.

This course provides a comprehensive understanding of Beirut through urban planning documents from the 20th century, produced under various political regimes (Ottoman, French Mandate, Lebanese Republic). By analyzing these plans within their national and regional contexts, students will gain insight into the mineralized and chaotic landscape of the Lebanese capital. Field visits will further enhance students' ability to assess the urbanization processes impacting Beirut.

o11GECAL1 Cartography and Cartographic Language 3 Cr.

This course is open to all students, especially in the fields of humanities and social sciences. It is primarily designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Environment and Spatial Planning, and Tourism and Cultural Management.

This course offers a comprehensive understanding of map usage, and introduces students to cartographic language, which has its own distinct grammar.

It also equips students with the necessary skills to effectively "use geomatics tools" and "apply techniques relevant to tourism professions".

o11GECCL3 Climate Change: Environmental, Human, and Geopolitical Issues 3 Cr.

This course explores the integral role of climate within the natural environment and its influence on human lifestyles. While societies have adapted to and harnessed climatic conditions, it is important to understand that human activities also impact the climate. These activities can alter the environment both intentionally and unintentionally, affecting the climate on a global scale through climate change, or on a local scale, through issues such as urban pollution. As climate change becomes increasingly evident due to human actions, this course addresses key questions: What will be the future of our climate? How will these changes affect societies? What are the implications of this atmospheric evolution? Acknowledging climate change as the biggest challenge of the 21st century, many countries are mobilizing efforts to mitigate its progress.

011TOLLL3 Coastal Areas: Issues and Risks

2 Cr.

This course prepares students to analyze the environmental and socio-economic challenges specific to coastal areas. It aims to equip them with the necessary skills to contribute to the sustainable management of these areas and to develop strategies for adapting to rising sea levels.

ثقافة وحياة Culture and Life

2 Cr.

This course focuses on reading and discussing selected texts from Lebanese culture, literature, and current affairs.

o11GEEDL4 Development Opportunities and Challenges in Lebanon and the Middle East 3 Cr.

This three-part course begins by defining the boundaries of the Middle East and then delves into the challenges posed by migration flows affecting the region, including both immigration and emigration. The second part examines the water crisis, analyzing sharing agreements and their impact on human activities and economic sectors such as agriculture, industry, and tourism. Finally, the third part explores the role of oil in the region and its global significance, assessing its influence on the development of Gulf countries and future projections.

011GECOL3 Digital Cartography

3 Cr.

This course is open to all students, especially in the fields of humanities and social sciences. It is primarily designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Environment and Spatial Planning, and Tourism and Cultural Management.

This course enables students to create digital thematic maps by applying various methods of analytical cartography using computer tools.

It also equips students with the necessary skills to effectively "use geomatics tools" and "apply techniques relevant to tourism professions".

011GEDEL3 External Dynamics of the Earth

3 Cr.

This course provides students with a thorough understanding of geomorphological processes, such as erosion, that shape the Earth's surface. It equips them with the necessary knowledge to contribute to environmental protection and spatial planning.

011TOTEL1 Fieldwork

3 Cr.

011PHPEL1 Foundations of Ethical Thought

2 Cr.

This course explores the philosophy of ethics, laying the foundational principles necessary for intellectual development and practical applications. It examines how various ethical frameworks, such as medical, business, engineering, and environmental ethics, are grounded in moral principles.

This course aims to articulate and justify the different ethical foundations proposed by philosophical thought throughout history, including knowledge, will, sensitivity, utility, affectivity, and rationality. It will also address

fundamental questions, such as the distinction between ethics and morality, the origins of moral questioning, and the relationship between individual and collective ethics. Additionally, this course examines the two major ethical theories: deontological and utilitarian, that dominate contemporary ethical debates.

011GESRL2 Geological Structures and Relief

3 Cr.

This course enables students to understand the connections between geological structures and landforms, and equips them with the necessary skills to effectively apply this knowledge. It aims to foster regional expertise in environmental management and spatial planning.

011TOLML1 Global Tourism Destinations

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management, it is also open to all USJ students.

It enables students, through a geographical approach to tourism phenomena, to analyze the exponential growth of international tourism, identify various tourist destinations. By examining various tourist spaces and the factors driving their "touristification," students will learn to develop tourism products suited to specific contexts. Additionally, it equips students with the necessary skills to effectively "integrate spatial analysis", "understand local and international tourism dynamics", and "integrate tourism practices into a local and sustainable development approach".

011GEPPL2 Heritage and Heritage Development

3 Cr.

011GCAIL2 Information Collection and Analysis

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management, it is also open to all USJ students.

It equips undergraduate students with the necessary skills for effective documentation and data collection for their graded assignments, such as presentations, reports, projects, etc. Additionally, it provides them with methods for analyzing various types of documents (maps, charts, etc.) to extract useful information for their research.

011GEDIL1 Internal Dynamics of the Earth

3 Cr.

This course focuses on the fundamental concepts and processes of plate tectonics and the Earth's internal structure and functioning. It equips students with the knowledge necessary to understand the phenomena that shape the Earth's environment, including the formation of landforms.

011GENSL1 Introduction to Environmental Studies

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentration: Environment and Spatial Planning, it is also open to students from other disciplines. It equips them with the necessary skills to master fundamental concepts to address issues within their field of study.

011GEIGL3 Introduction to Geoarchaeology

3 Cr.

011TOIPL1 Introduction to Heritage

3 Cr.

This course is designed for students enrolled in the first semester of the Bachelor in Geography program, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students.

This course inspires and deepens students' interest in both global and national heritage. It provides an opportunity to explore Lebanon's rich cultural heritage through lectures and field visits.

011GEPLL1 Landscapes of Lebanon and the Middle East

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Environment and Spatial Planning, and Tourism and Cultural Management. Located at the crossroads of Europe, Asia, and Africa, the Middle East lies in the southwestern part of Asia, the largest of these continents. It shares certain characteristics with Asia, particularly the contrast between vast, humid mountain ranges and extensive, semi-arid plateaus.

The course offers an in-depth exploration of this distinctive region through the use of iconography, cartographic documentation, and Earth observation tools.

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Master spatial analysis techniques
- Conduct environmental research

011TOCAL5 Map Reading

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Environment and Spatial Planning, and Tourism and Cultural Management. It focuses on practical cartography exercises, offering students a tangible understanding of their environment while developing essential working methods and reasoning skills. Through learning to read and interpret maps, students will enhance their analytical abilities and gain the competence to describe utilize map information effectively.

This course equips students with the following skills: "Master Spatial Analysis", "Use geomatics tools", and "Enhance knowledge".

o11GEMIL3 Migration: International Challenges and Issues

3 Cr.

This course begins with a brief overview of different types of migration and their historical development. It then delves into labor migration, exploring the benefits and challenges it presents for host countries. This course also explores forced or coerced migration caused by factors such as climate change, earthquakes, wars, and economic crises. Finally, it concludes on an optimistic note by discussing various forms of leisure migration.

011LFCEL1 Oral and Written Communication

4 Cr.

This course is designed to address the linguistic needs of students at the Saint Joseph University of Beirut. It aims to enhance students' abilities to communicate fluently, clearly, and effectively across various oral situations, including spontaneous speech, interviews, presentations, debates, and meetings.

Additionally, this course focuses on developing students' skills in writing, reading, and research on contemporary topics relevant to their field of study.

By the end of this course, students will be able to prepare oral presentations and utilize oral communication for professional purposes. They will also be able to independently write a research brief on a current issue and present arguments in a clear and compelling manner.

011SAIPL1 Professional Integration

3 Cr.

This course prepares students to the workforce by providing guidance, educational resources, and valuable insights. It aims to support students in their transition to professional life by helping them assess and highlight their skills, improve their oral and written communication for professional settings, identify the most suitable career path, and successfully integrate into the professional world.

011GEM2L6 Quantitative Methods: Processing and Analysis

3 Cr.

This course trains students in quantitative techniques that incorporate a spatial dimension, essential for research employing spatial analysis methodologies. It covers a range of topics including elementary indicators, geographical distributions, spatial relationships, factorial analysis, and classification methods.

011GERVL4 Risks and Vulnerability

3 Cr.

This course begins by clarifying the fundamental concepts of risk and vulnerability. It then equips students with the skills necessary to tackle the challenges associated with both natural and technological risks, as well as the vulnerability of human societies to these risks

011SATCL2 Sociology: Selected Themes

3 Cr.

This course aims to apply fundamental sociological concepts to contemporary social issues through a selection of representative themes. It offers students a range of complementary and contrasting analyses of specific institutions or topics. Additionally, this course develops students' cognitive and critical thinking skills.

011GEDDL3 Sustainable Development in the 21st Century

3 Cr.

This course, offered by the Department of Geography is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography other disciplines.

Sustainable Development (SD) is a strategic concept aimed at achieving "well-being by humanizing and ecologicalizing the economy". In response to threats such as resource depletion and environmental degradation, SD envisions a world where poverty, social inequalities, and environmental pressures are significantly reduced. Sustainable Development emerged from a threefold awareness:

- The dangers our current lifestyles pose to the planet.
- The persistent inequalities between people, particularly between the Global North and South.
- The concerns associated with economic development.

SD advocates for effective "governance", by assessing risks, informing, and guiding political and economic actions to address a wide range of global issues. It addresses the interconnectedness of economic, social, and environmental crises.

This course introduces the origins and principles of SD, evaluates its objectives, and explores whether it represents an idealistic vision or a practical approach.

Additionally, it equips students with the following skills: "Address and resolve environmental issues", "Conduct environmental research", and "Enhance knowledge".

011TOVDL1 Travel and Destinations

3 Cr.

The course begins with an overview of the global distribution of major tourist destinations and then examines the evolution of cultural, environmental, and societal trends among tourists since the 1950s. It further analyzes the development of tourism offerings through case studies of specific destinations and assess the impacts of tourism on these locations. The course is open to all USJ students.

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4 Cr.

011GELVL3 Urban Readings

011SGDVL4

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Tourism and Cultural Management, and Environment and Spatial Planning. It is also open to all USJ students.

It enables undergraduate students to identify and analyze the components of various types of urban fabric. Such understanding is essential for interpreting urban forms and the socio-economic factors that shape them.

011GERVL3 Urban Storytelling

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor's students in Geography, concentrations: Tourism and Cultural Management, and Environment and Spatial Planning. It is also open to all USJ students.

This course enables undergraduate students to present a tourist site within an urban setting. It equips students with the necessary skills to prepare a guided tour by researching the location, identifying its key, drafting an informative presentation, and delivering an oral narration.

064VALEL1 USJ Values in Daily Life

2 Cr.

This course aims to familiarize students with the fundamental values of the Saint Joseph University of Beirut (USJ) so that they can integrate them into their personal, interpersonal, and professional lives. It engages them in critical reflection on how the values outlined in the USJ Charter can influence their behaviors, actions, and decisions in addressing the challenges of the contemporary world. Additionally, students will become aware of global issues and ethical responsibilities, preparing them to positively contribute to the building of a better society.

011HIMCL3 War in the Contemporary World

2 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor students in History, concentration: International Relations. It is also open to all USJ students. This course enables students to analyze the nature, causes, and forms of conflicts in both ancient and contemporary contexts, as well as the evolving relationship between individuals and modern warfare.



011GEMTL4 Water: Myth and Tourism

3 Cr.

This course explores the myths associated with water across diverse civilizations. Water symbolizes a spectrum of concepts, from life and regeneration to death and eternal existence in funerary rites. These symbolic meanings are deeply rooted in both historical and geographical contexts. This course aims to analyze these myths within their geographical and historical contexts, offering new perspectives for tourism discovery, particularly in the Middle East and Mediterranean regions.

COURSE DESCRIPTION OF FUNDAMENTAL COURSES

Concentration: Environment and Spatial Planning

011GECHL3 Centralities and Urban Hierarchy

3 Cr.

This course is designed for both Bachelor and Master students in Geography, concentrations: Environmental and Spatial Planning and Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students. This course aims to deepen students' understanding of the complex urban systems, including their functioning and dynamics, as essential elements in comprehending geographic space organization. It covers fundamental urban geography concepts such as urban systems, networks, and frameworks. Additionally, it explores spatial analysis techniques applied to urban areas, including space-distance, center/periphery, interurban/intraurban location, and hierarchy, across various scales.

011COSEL5 Conferences and Seminars

3 Cr.

011GECGL6 Geomorphological Cartography

3 Cr.

This course equips students with the necessary skills and knowledge to understand and map landforms and associated features. It includes practical field surveying experience and the use of tools such as Geographic Information Systems (GIS), with a focus on applying these techniques to environmental planning.

011GEHNL6 Human/Nature Relationship

з Cr.

This course addresses the current ecological crisis threatening humanity's future, which is directly linked to human activities. It aims to understand the evolving relationship between humans and nature throughout history, enhance students' understanding of how human behaviors impact the environment, and influence their environmental approaches and perspectives.

011TOMML4 Mountain Environments: Issues and Risks

3 Cr.

This course provides students with the essential knowledge to understand and assess the specific challenges posed by human activities in mountainous regions. It focuses on safeguarding mountain environments and communities from the specific risks associated with these areas.

011GEPEL6 Paleoenvironments

3 Cr.

This course explores past environments to clarify the interdependencies between climate, the environment, and living organisms, and how these relationships have evolved over Earth's history. By examining paleoenvironments, especially paleoclimates, students will gain a deeper understanding of how climate influences environmental changes.

011GEPHL4 Photo-interpretation

3 Cr.

This course equips students with the necessary knowledge and skills to interpret aerial photographs, enabling them to detect and analyze surface phenomena and environmental changes, and to effectively communicate their findings.

011GETEL4 Remote Sensing: Data, Processing, and Analysis

3 Cr.

This course equips students with the necessary skills to extract information from Earth observation satellite images, and solve environmental problems.

After covering fundamental concepts and physical principles of remote sensing (such as image acquisition techniques and spectral behavior), students will be able to apply satellite image analysis and processing methods, including visualization, enhancement, transformation, and both supervised and unsupervised classification.

011GENRL6 Research Paper: Environment and Spatial Planning

3 Cr.

on GEAAL4 Spatial Analysis in Environmental and Tourism Management

3 Cr.

This course focuses on spatial analysis, which examines the properties of geographically located objects. It explores how location can be studied both as an independent factor and as a key element in explaining the diversity of places, thereby facilitating data analysis. This course aims to demonstrate how location provides valuable insights into the studied objects, and helps explain their characteristics. By the end of this course, students will be able to describe the specific arrangement of geographic objects, identify their spatial organization, and detect spatial structures using appropriate methods and techniques.

o11GEANL5 Specialized English: Environment and Spatial Planning

4 Cr.

011GECCL5 Thematic and Cartographic Design

3 Cr.

This course is designed for both Bachelor and Master students in Geography, concentrations: Environmental and Spatial Planning and Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students. This course covers the various stages of cartographic construction, including analytical and synthesizing cartographic representation.

011GEM2L5 Urban Morphology: Structures and Dynamics

3 Cr.

This course is designed for both Bachelor and Master students in Geography, concentrations: Environmental and Spatial Planning and Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students. This course explains the current urban explosion, the dramatic growth of major cities, and the recent urban transformations that have resulted. It involves analyzing urban macroform, its morphogenesis, structure, and evolution.

Additionally, this course equips students with the following skills: "Memorize and articulate fundamental concepts of environmental geography," with a particular focus on urban geography, and "Grasp and interpret spatial and systemic approaches".

011GEAUL6 Urban Planning

3 Cr.

011GERDL3 Water: Resources, and Sustainable Development

3 Cr.

This course examines the critical challenge of water resources, which, alongside climate change, represents one of the greatest threats to humanity. Despite its apparent abundance, water is unevenly distributed and limited, with urgent issues evident in both industrialized and developing countries. This course highlights how human activities degrade this vital resource and contribute to pollution, despite the growing shortage. Additionally, it explores how demographic explosion, industrial activities, and agricultural practices have led to both qualitative and quantitative shortages in certain regions, resulting in conflicts over water usage and, in severe cases, geopolitical disputes. Recent decades have seen a dramatic increase in water-related risks, such as flooding, leading to substantial socio-economic losses. This course emphasizes the imperative need for rational and integrated water management strategies to preserve this crucial resource for the future.

011TOVVL6 Heritage: Vulnerability and Enhancement

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor students in Geography, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students. It enables them to identify the pressures on various types of heritage, diagnose their vulnerabilities, outline the steps in heritage valuation, and propose recommendations for appropriate heritage enhancement within a specific context and for sustainable tourism development.

This course equips students with the following skills: "Heritage Valuation", "Tourism Product Development", and "Sustainable Tourism Advising".

011TOTOL6 Organized Tours Management

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor students in Geography, and is also open to all USJ students.

It introduces the various actors and travel creators and guides students in designing travel itineraries that are thoughtful, logical, and diverse, taking into account various selection criteria. Students will explore the attractions of different countries and destinations, while gaining a comprehensive understanding of how tourism partners operate. By the end of this course, students will be able to create well-organized and effective travel circuits.

011TOTRL5 Responsible Tourism in Lebanon

3 Cr.

This course is designed for students enrolled in the second semester of the Bachelor in Geography program, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students.

In the first part, this course traces the origins of ecotourism and its evolution up to the Brundtland Report (1988), which laid the groundwork for sustainable development. The second part uses case studies to examine the changing attitudes of tourists worldwide and the emergence of responsible tourism. The final part focuses on Lebanon, allowing students to assess the state of responsible tourism in their country also through case studies, alongside field visits and meetings with industry professionals.

011TOANL5 Specialized English 4 Cr.

o11TOADL4 Tourism Actors and Development

3 Cr.

This course is designed for Bachelor students in Geography, concentration: Tourism and Cultural Management. It is also open to all USJ students. This course offers a comprehensive understanding of the dynamics between stakeholders and tourism development. By the end of this course, students will be able to define tourism development, identify the key players involved, and analyze their roles in the process.

011TOETL5 Tourism Destinations in the Middle East and Lebanon

This course begins by defining the geographical boundaries of the Middle East and exploring the region's diverse countries, highlighting both their commonalities and unique characteristics. It then examines the evolution of tourism across different historical periods, using Lebanon and another selected country as case studies for each era. This approach helps students develop a deeper understanding of the challenges and opportunities in tourism development, focusing on Lebanon and the Gulf countries as they transition towards a post-oil economy.
