INSTITUTE OF ORIENTAL STUDIES (ILO)

HISTORY

The Saint Joseph University of Beirut founded the Oriental College in 1902, which later became the Institute of Oriental Studies. Its mission was to educate students about the rich cultural heritage of the Arab East and to promote research in related fields. This initiative was aligned with the Arab literary revival, positioning the Oriental College as a pivotal force in this movement.

It has significantly contributed to the field through the dedication of Jesuit scholars such as Louis Cheikho and Henry Lammens, who trained generations of specialists recognized for their expertise in Arabic and Oriental literature, sociology, and Islamic studies. The college's publications have been vital in advancing scholarly approaches and highlighting the richness of Eastern and Arabic culture, particularly through the Saint Joseph University Journal, the Mashrig Journal, and various research publications.

Following a necessary interruption in academic activities due to World War I, the college resumed its educational programs in 1933, focusing on Oriental literature. Notable literary and academic figures from this period include the Jesuit fathers Motard and Mesbian, Professor Fouad Afram al-Bustani, and Prince Maurice Chehab.

In 1936, the Saint Joseph University restructured and established the Institute of Oriental Studies to continue the legacy of the Oriental College. The Faculty of Arts at the University of Lyon in France oversaw the institute's programs and exams. It also recruited distinguished scholars, including Father Henry Fleish, an expert in Arabic linguistics, and Professor Khalil Jarr, a specialist in Arabic philosophy. In 1977, the University formally established the Faculty of Humanities, integrating the Institute of Oriental Studies, which continues to thrive within this framework. Since the 2002-2003 academic year, the Institute of Oriental Studies has implemented the European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) to enhance educational outcomes for its students. This system aligns with global academic standards and strengthens international collaborations. It aims to honor the unique aspects of Arabic and Islamic studies while fostering ties with the Arab and Islamic worlds.

MISSION

The Institute of Oriental Studies upholds the legacy of the "Oriental College," founded in 1902 to explore Arab Eastern culture and teach related subjects. Since its establishment in 1933 and its incorporation into the Faculty of Humanities in 1977, the institute has been dedicated to the advancement of Arab culture. It emphasizes areas such as Arabic language and literature, Islamic and Arab philosophy, Arab and Islamic history, and Islamic sciences. With this mission, the institute aims to deliver high-quality education that engages both the local community and the broader Arab world, while continuously enhancing research methodologies and evaluating its programs.
