The Oriental Library: A Unique Heritage in Lebanon and the Near East

The Oriental Library, founded on the rich troves gathered by generations of Jesuit scholars since the 19th century, is a leading research institution specializing in Middle Eastern studies. As the third largest private heritage library in the region, it houses an extensive collection of 230,000 volumes, including early editions of chronicles and travelogues by Oriental scholars, alongside works by Arab poets and intellectuals. The library also holds 1,800 journals and periodicals, an extensive collection of Armenian studies materials, and a rich collection of newspapers and magazines dating back to the early days of the Arabic press in Beirut and Cairo during the late 19th century. Additionally, the library possesses 250 lithographs and 3,700 manuscripts in Arabic and other Oriental languages including Syriac, Turkish, Persian, and Armenian. Its map collection archive, comprising 250,000 images, is the largest and most comprehensive in the Middle East. Furthermore, from 1906 to 2000, the Oriental Library published the annual multidisciplinary journal *Mélanges de l'Université Saint-Joseph*, which covered archaeology, history, epigraphy, and philology of the Near and Middle East.

The Map Archive

Among the most extensive in the country and the region, this collection includes 4,110 geographical maps and plans, featuring approximately 250 maps of Lebanon, with around 60 specifically detailing Beirut. Notable items include the 1861 French expedition map of Lebanon and the 1908 plan of Beirut. This collection has been foundational in researching 19th-century Beirut, a period of significant economic, demographic, and social transformations. It also provides valuable insights into the historical connections between France and Lebanon, particularly through the French Army's early work in territorial mapping and representation.

Additionally, the collection features other significant series, such as the Tubingen Collection (100 maps) and maps from the Atlas of France (80 maps).

The maps cover a wide range of themes, encompassing topography, economics, geology, archaeology, demographics, and hydrography, among others.

2. Conservation and Restoration Needs

A conservation specialist has assessed the map collection, classifying the maps based on their condition into three categories: severely damaged, moderately damaged, and lightly damaged.

The deterioration is due to multiple factors, including dust accumulation, foxing, acidity, various gaps and tears (particularly along the folds), and the use of brittle materials and adhesive tape. It has been identified that approximately 74 maps require urgent attention for conservation and restoration.





Figure 1 | General Condition of the Map Archive





Figure 4 | "Plan of Beirut - 1870" Recto: Dust accumulation, tears, gaps

Figures 9 and 10 | "Ecclesiastical Map of India" Recto and verso: Dust accumulation, tears, adhesive tape, and tears along the folds


