FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN 150 YEARS OF USJ



One of the pillars of our new fundraising campaign "USJ, Aspire for More", launched as part of the Saint Joseph University of Beirut's (USJ) 150th anniversary celebration in 2025, is to achieve "More Social Responsibility". This campaign aims to address the social, societal, and environmental challenges facing our community.

We prioritize civic and social activities and aim to actively contribute to societal transformation.

1. PROJECT TITLE

Training in Democratic Citizenship

2. APPLICANT

Faculty of Religious Studies at the Saint Joseph University of Beirut (USJ) and Fondation USJ.

3. LOCATION

This training is taking place at the Saint Joseph University of Beirut, Humanities Campus, Building A, Room 808.

4. PROJECT OVERVIEW

Citizenship in Lebanon

The pervasive influence of sectarianism in the Lebanese society introduces ambiguity regarding national identity and the development of a collective welfare. Historical and sometimes ethnically religious communities function as "supra-functional" groups, often assuming responsibilities beyond ritual practices and overlapping with governmental functions. Individuals naturally identify with a religious sect, fostering a deep sense of belonging and embracing traditional societal and state perspectives that may not align with modern citizenship principles.

However, Lebanon's longstanding cultural exchange with the West has established a constitutional framework embracing both democratic principles and confessional arrangements. This unique blend underscores the foundational democratic values deeply rooted in the education of Lebanese citizens. This complex interplay between sectarianism and democracy, fosters a consciousness of Lebanese citizenship that reconciles these divergent concepts. This analysis underscores the importance, even urgency, of introducing **democratic citizenship education** programs, particularly focusing on teachers. They can play a pivotal role in nurturing democratic principles among their students, guiding them to understand the appropriate role of religion within their social and civic lives.

5. OBJECTIVE AND DURATION

This training aims to equip teachers from various disciplines with a comprehensive understanding of democratic citizenship principles to foster the development of their students' civic skills.

The training will span 5 days, after which teachers are expected to develop projects with their students, aligned with the covered themes. A closing ceremony, organized in collaboration with our partner, will celebrate the accomplishments of participating teachers. Certificates and awards will be presented to recognize teachers who have excelled in implementing impactful civic projects, promoting broader participation from public and private schools across the country.

6. TARGET BENEFICIARIES

25 high school teachers will participate in each training session, and then develop projects with their students. With an average class size of around 30 students, this initiative will directly impact and benefit approximately 750 high school students.

7. RESOURCES

To fund this project, we seek the solidarity and generosity of donors interested in supporting this training at the Faculty of Religious Studies, particularly organizations dedicated to promoting citizenship and sustainable peace in Lebanon. It is worth noting that this training will be free of charge for teachers.

8. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE REQUEST

\$15,900 per training session (fifteen thousand nine hundred US dollars).

9. DETAILED BUDGET AND FUNDING

Donors will finance 93.5% of the project, and USJ will cover the remaining 6.5%.

10. PROJECT RESULTS AND REPORTING

Results

To assess the training's impact, pre-and post-training evaluations will be conducted among the students in the respective classes.

Transparency

By the end of the training, we will provide a financial report. Additionally, the donor will receive invitations to project presentations and the certificate award ceremony.

Annually, we distribute an impact report to the USJ community, as well as friends and donors.
